Election Forum

Canadians go to the polls for the 43rd time on October 21, 2019. This will give voters a chance to pass judgment on the record of the Trudeau Liberal government elected four years ago. The traditional Conservative and New Democrat opposition parties will be led by new and different leaders, while two small parties (Greens and the right-wing People’s Party) are seeking to change the terms of debate. The forum will hear short presentations from UBC colleagues and then open the floor to questions and discussion.

Ken Carty (Emeritus, Political Science) will chair and set the context; **Richard Johnston** (Political Science) will consider changes in public opinion and the character of campaigns; **Kevin Milligan** (Economics) will discuss the economic record and the parties' proposals for the future; **Kathryn Harrison** (Political Science) will explore the extent to which the environment is at issue and the parties’ records and commitments.

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


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The Emeritus College (formerly UBCAPE) could not function without the contribution of many past Presidents/Principals who continue to provide their services. Their names are listed on the College website.

Principal's Report

As we begin the first fully active academic year for the College, I wanted to bring you up to date with our activities since the last newsletter in April of this year. It has been an active spring and summer. In late April, some Council members attended a meeting of the BC Tri-University Council of Emeriti Associations hosted at the University of Victoria. We meet annually to share information and plan for the future. We will host next year's meeting.

At the May 15 Senate Meeting, then-Principal Dianne Newell delivered the College's first annual report. In late May, a delegation that included Dianne and I attended the annual conference of the Canadian University Retiree Associations of Canada (CURAC) at the University of Guelph. The two-day meeting included some fascinating talks on diverse subjects such as Agri-Foods for Human Health and Feeding the Future: Climate Change, Population Growth and Technology. Sharing information on conference planning was particularly valuable as the College will be hosting the 2020 conference here at UBC, May 13-15 (mark the dates). Finally, at the end of May and into June, Dianne and I, with the direct support of the Provost's Office, represented the



College, and in a sense Canada, at the inaugural conference of the European Association of Professors Emeriti (EAPE) at the University of Athens, Greece. We each made a presentation and were pleased to share information about our College with the other delegates. We came to realize that our invitation to attend was a result of the widespread interest in the College. They were clear that the College is unique among emeritus organizations and were keen to see if the model could be replicated in Europe.

The coming year is bound to be exciting as we establish our identity as a college with both internal and external audiences. As a final note, I would like to thank Don Blake, the outgoing Editor of this Newsletter, for his dedicated and fine service to both the Association and now the College. Of course, we owe a great debt to Dianne Newell, the founding Principal of the College. Through persistence and hard work she managed to lead us through the difficult transition phase of creating our College. Finally, a big and grateful welcome to Margery Fee (Newsletter Editor) and her Co-Chair of the Communication Committee, Herbert Rosengarten.

Report on the Annual General Meeting April 17, 2019

The last meeting of the 2018-19 academic year was held in the dining room of St. John’s College. Following a delicious lunch, College Members elected (by acclamation) a new slate of officers and members-at-large, and paid tribute to those who are leaving the College Council. As is customary at the AGM, musical entertainment was provided. This year EnChor Choir presented a varied program ranging from Brahms’s classic “Wondrous Cool, Thou Woodland Quiet” to contemporary works such as “Fare Thee Well Love” by the Rankin Family, beautifully arranged by Vancouver musician Stephen Smith. Audience members joined in for one selection—“Edelweiss” from *The Sound of Music*. EnChor’s Artistic Director, Morna Edmundson, is one of Canada’s best-known choral conductors. She is also Artistic Director of the award-winning Elektra Women’s Choir. Her father, Don Russell, Professor Emeritus of Geophysics, was a proud audience member. Senior Scholars' Series: The Passions that Drive Academic Life

Joanne Weinberg Thursday 10 Oct at 5 pm. Green College Coach House

From Basic Science to Clinical Research: A Neuroscientist's Journey

After teaching high school biology for several years, Joanne Weinberg entered a PhD program in Neuroscience as the oldest student in the class. Research opportunities and fortuitous connections with people along her path led her from basic studies on the effects of early life experience and stress on brain and biological development to a focus on the adverse effects of prenatal exposure to alcohol, utilizing rodent models to examine alcohol's impact from the prenatal period through adulthood. Her latest research, part of the NIH Collaborative Initiative on Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (CIFASD), investigates alcohol-induced effects on immune profiles of pregnant women and on immune function and health of children across the lifespan, a critical but understudied area in the FASD field.

Film Understated Scotland

Presenter John LeBlanc will give a short introduction to each film and lead a short discussion after the screening.

Series Nine: From the golden age of Hollywood to the baroque stylings of present-day cinema, commercial feature fiction films tend towards overstatement, reinforcing their status as spectacle. One example of an opposite tendency towards understatement can be found in films emanating from Scottish landscapes and/or directors. Here, humble wisdom, humble surroundings, and humble film craftsmanship produce a refreshing array of small films that, quietly, have become cinema classics. Such films focus, tenderly, on family and personal relationships, valuing simple virtues against an age dominated by narcissistic self-aggrandizement.

Sept. 24 – I Know Where I’m Going (1945) by Michael Powell, an English director whose unconventional career (which began with war-era propagandistic films) includes two much-praised films set in Scotland. This film, like the earlier *The Edge of the World* (1937), takes place in a remote island off the Scottish coast. Part of Powell’s and his producer / screenwriter partner, Emeric Pressburger’s “crusade against materialism,” the film focuses on a young woman who thinks her life has been made when she is to marry a wealthy nobleman, only to have fate intervene and dramatically change the course of her existence.

Oct. 22 – Housekeeping (1987) by Scottish director Bill Forsyth, expresses an understated sensibility that did not keep him from having a moderately successful international career. This film, less known than his hit, *Local Hero*, and shot in the Nelson, B.C. area, is a little seen cult favourite. Based on a (contested) feminist novel by Marilynne Robinson, the film focuses on a rootless young woman who suddenly returns to her small community and family in the 1950s Pacific Northwest. Eccentric Aunt Sylvie’s arrival

transforms the lives of those around her, stirring up complex memories and feelings, especially in her two nieces, with Forsyth attempting to translate Robinson's fluid language onto film.

Nov. 26 – Ratcatcher (1999) by Lynne Ramsay focuses on a young boy in Glasgow, Scotland, whose dream of a better life and potential for art are compromised by the crushing poverty of the Govan neighbourhood that surrounds him. Set during the national garbage strike of 1973, the film is director Ramsay's feature debut (at that point the only one by a Scottish woman), but its stunning visuals have kept her on the margins of the international feature film industry ever since. Following up on UK social issue films that focus on adolescence, such as Ken Loach's *Kes* and Bill Douglas's trilogy, Ramsay exhibits a stronger visual flair, combining documentary realism with a sense of the surreal.

Awards: Order of Canada

Arthur (Skip) Ray (Professor Emeritus, History) was named an Officer of the Order of Canada for "his contributions as a historical geographer and expert witness in Aboriginal land claims." His first book, *Indians in the Fur Trade* (1974), caught the attention of First Nations and Métis groups and their lawyers, who thought that his work on the historical economic geography of indigenous groups was relevant to their Aboriginal and treaty rights struggles in the courts. As a result of research done on their behalf, he appeared as an expert witness in a number of landmark cases, most notably *Delgamuukw v. Regina* (1997), *Regina v. Horseman* (1990), and *Regina v. Powley* (2003).



Awards: Order of Canada (cont'd)



Peter Suedfeld (Psychology) has been made an Officer of the Order of Canada. "Peter Suedfeld's ground-breaking research expands our notions of resilience. Professor Emeritus at University of British Columbia and prolific writer, he is internationally acclaimed for documenting previously ignored positive psychological and physical effects of extreme and challenging environments. His work transcends academic fields and has notably been critical in our understanding of the impacts of polar isolation, space exploration, sensory deprivation, crisis decision-making, and traumatic experiences such as genocide." Citation by the Governor General's Office

Ray Cole, Professor Emeritus in the UBC School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture (SALA), has been named a Member of the Order of Canada. His citation recognizes his "his skilful pairing of architecture and environmental sustainability, and ... his leadership in the field." Cole taught at SALA for 40 years, serving as director between 2006 and 2009, before retiring in 2017. His outstanding teaching in the fields of environmental issues, regenerative design, and environmental performance in building design has been recognized by several awards.



Other Awards

The Faculty of Applied Science Dean's Medal of Distinction was awarded to retired School of Nursing faculty member **Shelagh Smith** in April, 2019. The medal recognizes individuals who have brought high honour to the Faculty and/or made longstanding or significant contributions to advance its vision, mission and mandate. Smith, a double alumna of the UBC School of Nursing, has made many generous commitments to the school. In addition to supporting a variety of scholarships and funds, she established the Shelagh J. Smith Award for Mature Students in Nursing in 2014. This award ensures that undergraduate students who must balance their intensive, rigorous studies with work, volunteer commitments and family responsibilities need not compromise their academic excellence due to financial need.



Other Awards cont'd

Peter Moogk (History) was awarded the Geldert Medal by the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada in September 2018 "for the best researched and best-written article published in *The Canadian Philatelist*." ["Transatlantic Mail between France and Canada before 1760," March/April 2017, pp.89-95.] In December 2018 he received the Colonel Commandant's Commendation [The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery] for "exemplary commitment to the preservation, display and interpretation of the history and heritage of the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery."

Miriam Clavir (Museum of Anthropology) is receiving an Alumni of Influence award from University College, University of Toronto, for her work in museum conservation, particularly in relation to material heritage collected from Indigenous communities. Miriam has been a key figure in changing the field of conservation to recognize that it is preserving not just physical objects, but cultural belongings with which the originators have ongoing relationships, and it is crucial to work with these groups.



Lance M. Rucker (Dentistry) has just been elected Regent of Regency 8 of the American College of Dentists, an international organization founded in 1920 with the primary role of guardianship of professionalism and ethics in the profession of dentistry. It is a very active honour organization, particularly in North America. Dr. Rucker's appointment is for four years and will involve considerable travel in support of the geographically broad Regency which he represents. It includes the States of Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, and Utah, as well as the provinces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba.

Andrew Busza (English) has had his poetry celebrated in Poland in several cities as part of Polish celebration of the Polish diaspora.

Anne Tilley (Physical Education) received a 50th Anniversary Commemorative Award earlier this year from BC Special Olympics, a sports organization for individuals who are intellectually disabled. A founding member of BCSO in 1968, she undertook several projects with them.

Mandakranta Bose was awarded a special citation for her work by the Lower Mainland Bengali Cultural Society in October 2018. The following month, she received a Drishti Lifetime Achievement Award for her dedication, professionalism, and vital contribution, which have brought recognition to the community. She spent Trinity term 2019 as a visiting Senior Fellow, Oxford Centre for Hindu Studies to work on a course text, "Women and Religion in the Hindu Tradition."

Shauna Butterwick (Educational Studies) has been inducted into the International Adult and Continuing Education Hall of Fame.

What Are They Up to Now?

Gordon Munro (Economics), has been involved in the economics of natural resources, fishery resources in particular, since the early 1970s. The Sea Fish Industry Authority (UK) invited him to participate in an intensive one-day workshop, "Game Theory for International Fisheries," for a select group of senior industry representatives and UK government officials, held in London at the Royal Institute of International Affairs in early May.

Margaret Slade (Economics) participated in two panels on vertical integration—one organized by the US Federal Trade Commission in Washington, DC, in November 2018, and the second organized by the OECD in Paris on June 7 as part of the OECD Competition Committee meetings for heads of agencies and senior officials of the 36 OECD countries.

Gail Riddell has been involved in environmental/social justice activism in her community of Sechelt. She is currently organizing a federal election all-candidates' meeting around climate change. She also organizes monthly gatherings called "Drinks for the Future," a casual way for community members to meet over a beer and a local topic. She's on the steering committee of an organization called "Alliance4Democracy, which works to further the cause of democratic process locally and beyond. As part of that group, she is working to ban plastic bags in retail stores. She has also worked with others for two years to prevent the privatization of the local seniors' care facility.

What Are They Up to Now? (cont'd)

Donald Wehrung (Sauder) has been leading Paragon Testing Enterprises, a subsidiary of the University of British Columbia, and Canada’s largest deliverer of English-language proficiency tests. In June 2019, the company signed an agreement with the National Education Examinations Authority (NEEA) of the Chinese Ministry of Education to deliver the Canadian Academic English Language Test—Computer Edition (CAEL CE) in the People's Republic of China. Now Chinese students will be able to sit for an English proficiency test in China that evaluates their readiness for academic success in Canadian universities and colleges.

Jack Taunton (Sports Medicine) has been fundraising for the Chronic Brain Exercise Music and Mindfulness Program for Parkinson’s, MS, Alzheimer’s, Depression, Anxiety and Chronic Brain Injury (1M dollar donation) and to purchase a portable ultrasound for the Uganda Sports Medicine Clinic. He has also acted as coordinator of medical coverage for the International Jerome Track Meet (June 20), for the International Road Cycling Race for 120 women and 220 men (July 7) and as Medical Coordinator for the Grand Fondo of Fraser Valley (1300 riders; July 20). He also acted as Chair for the Super Week of cycling pro/Am Po Co Grand Prix, with 14,000 spectators (July 12) He co-founded this event. He was invited to speak on December 6 by the IOC Medical Commission to Chief Medical Officers for upcoming Olympic Games. He developed and started a Delta Fire Department Wellness Program in May for 188 Firefighters from Delta, Ladner and Tsawwassen.



For the month of July, the watercolours of Professor Emeritus **Peter Seixas** (Curriculum and Pedagogy) were featured on the walls of “Meet on Main” restaurant. Twenty-five of the twenty-seven paintings sold, in a highly successful benefit for Ecojustice.
