A less well-known area of specialization in physical therapy is the cardiovascular and pulmonary specialty, the focus of this textbook. Most physical therapy practice today involves the circulatory, heart and pulmonary system either to manage primary pathology in those systems, or secondarily for healing and repair in the management of musculoskeletal conditions. The leading causes of illness and premature death are related to these systems. Thus, prevention as well as the non-pharmacological management of conditions affecting these systems and even reversal, are core competencies within the cardiovascular and pulmonary specialty. Therapeutic exercise is the backbone of physical therapy practice which stresses the cardiovascular/pulmonary systems. The Crimean War (1854-56) is widely considered the first modern war with its tactical use of railways, telegraphs, and battleships, its long-range rifles, and its notorious trenches - precursors of the Great War. It is also the first media war: the first to know the impact of a correspondent on the field of battle and the first to be documented in photographs. No one, however, including the French themselves, seems to remember that France was there, fighting in Crimea, losing 95,000 soldiers and leading the Allied campaign to victory. It would seem that the Crimean War has no place in the canon of culturally retained historical events that define modern French identity.

Looking at literature, art, theatre, material objects, and medical reports, *The Crimean War and Cultural Memory* considers how the Crimean War was and was not represented in French cultural history in the second half of the nineteenth century. Ultimately, the book illuminates the forgotten traces that the Crimean War left on the French cultural landscape.

Using varied methods, the book addresses three principal questions: 1) What causes housing booms? 2) What are the economic and social consequences? 3) What is the range of policy responses? The globalization of housing markets in these cities is an important consideration, plus the development of housing as an investment asset for both global and local investors. Four of the cities have acute affordability problems. Singapore is the exception with a concerted policy of public housing supply, and strict controls via taxation on investor purchases.

There are few stories of entrepreneurial, business class women in nineteenth century BC. They didn't keep diaries or save letters like the ruling class women often did, and they were usually overlooked in newspaper reports. Yet many came to British Columbia in the early years of the gold rush and helped build and sustain the developing communities. Coming of age in Europe, the Lindhard sisters had aspirations that were restricted by societal norms about what women could and should be and do.

This is a story of how each of the sisters made a life for themselves: marrying and having children, becoming single parents at an early age, marrying again or not, working together, providing for their children, and making choices that set them on different paths. While their lives diverged at various points, their commitments to each other and the next generation remained strong.
