Conflicts over oil pipelines and carbon taxes have created intense debates among provinces and between provinces and the federal government. This talk reviews recent developments at the intersection of energy/climate policy and Canadian federalism and explores the question of how well suited Canadian institutions are to navigate the transition to a low-carbon economy.

Dr. Hoberg taught public policy and American politics in the Political Science department and then spent time teaching in the Faculty of Forestry. His research interests include environmental and natural resource policy, policy and institutional design, theories of policy change, the role of knowledge in the policy process, and international constraints on domestic policy autonomy. He has written books on US environmental policy, toxic substances regulation, and BC forest policy, and edited two books on comparative Canada-US policies.
